## **DIGITAL TV IS ALMOST HERE! OR NOT???**

The program provides \$40 vouchers for consumers to buy digital conversion boxes, which enable existing televisions to continue working with the new digital TV signals.

## "The Public Face of Ham Radio" By Joy Matlack, KD6FJV

There are more and more opportunities for us as Emergency Communicators and Disaster Service Workers to present ham radio to the general public. If we choose to take advantage of these, we need to really look at what we are presenting. The public is not generally interested in the same aspects of radio that we are. We get excited about the why's and wherefore's and comparing how good our signal is in a contest or as a participant in a net. The public, especially if they have not been exposed to radio, hear more bad than good about the hobby. Interference and unsightly antennas will usually be the first to be brought up. Instead of getting defensive and dismissive we should welcome these comments as an opportunity to share what we really do with those antennas.

The more we include ourselves in conversations with people, the higher the chance that we might be able to recruit them to our way of thinking. One of the biggest fans of Ham Radio I know is Pete Demetriou. Some of you may know Pete from his work in radio and on KFWB. I have had the privilege of knowing and working with Pete for over 10 years and he is one of the most enthusiastic supporters that we have in the general public. Pete has his own reasons for not getting a ham radio ticket, but he loves to talk about the support and resources to the communities that ham operators give. The reason I bring him up is that when you work an event or public presentation you never know who you are talking to or who they know. Can you imagine the impact that someone in Pete's position can have in all the subsequent conversations about what he learns from a presentation. A few minutes of careful reflection is all that is needed to convince us that a great presentation to the public is always a good thing for the reputation of ham radio operators and what they do.

So what exactly makes up a great presentation to the public? The first thing that I have always tried to do is present the face of the radios to the public side of the table. The face of a talking, lit up radio makes people stop. It is a magnet and a great way to start a conversation. At the last public event that we worked, I took out a couple of my handhelds, a stack of mobiles that I use for a portable command station, and a brand new Yaesu 857 that I had never had out of the box. No one was talking on the local repeaters so we broke the seals and drug out the new one. Not having planned ahead we had not brought an antenna for it. Not to let that stop us as part of the demonstration of the magic of radio we hooked up a wire to the center pin and had the other side linked to the canopy we were using for shade. That canopy let us hear conversations from Georgia and Florida during the entire time we were set up. What a great way to start a demo about radio! The HT's are used for extremely local conversations, a mobile will extend the range to region or state, and then the 857 was hearing across the country. I know that this might seem simplistic to some hams, but remember we are presenting to a non-technical public here. I realize that I have more options than some operators about radios to demo but my point is that it doesn't really take more than one. The key is to have it doing something that makes someone walking by look at it. Once they look you have the opportunity to start a conversation. That is one thing that someone playing with a radio with his back to the public cannot do.

In addition to the radio it also helps to have something to hand out to folks. Whether they take it or not is of no consequence. By having it available it shows that you are interested in giving them something to think about later. I generally try to have a few catalogs from HRO and/or some manufacturer brochures about radios. A list about some of the local clubs and of course if you are representing an organization some of those brochures are a must if they exist. Unfortunately, a lot of clubs do not have brochures, but a few copies of a recent newsletter can be just as good or better.

These are just some suggestions on things that I have found to be effective. There are many more people and groups that have worked public events - and most are happy to share their ideas and experiences. I hope the next time you get an opportunity you will take advantage of it. It is a great reminder for us all, as to why we chose to become ham radio operators in the first place.


