

## Cal Poly ARC Members Respond to Power Outage

When the power went down for more than 145,000 Pacific Gas and Electric (PG&E) customers in San Luis Obispo County, California, on June 23, members of the Cal Poly Amateur Radio Club (W6BHZ) sprang into action to provide needed emergency communication. The response by student and alumni members consisted of collecting status information from remote stations and relaying information obtained by net control through official channels, the club said in a news release. "CPARC demonstrated the importance of Amateur Radio Emergency Communications support in a professional and timely manner, providing the most current firsthand reports to the community," the club said in its news release. The situation was exacerbated by the absence of coverage on broadcast news outlets, in some cases due to the outage, and by a call overload on the PG&E information number. "Fortunately some residents have radio scanners and were listening to the radio net managed by CPARC on 146.67 MHz," where the countywide SLOECC net had opened, CPARC said. Some of these listeners credited the net with providing timely and independent reports. The outage, attributed to a power substation problem, lasted about 2 hours.

## **K2BSA To Be On the Air from 2013 National Scout Jamboree**

Amateur Radio will be a part of the 2013
Boy Scouts of America National Jamboree,
July 15-24, when some 40,000 Scouts and
leaders are expected at the Summit Bechtel
Reserve in Mount Hope, West Virginia.
K2BSA will be on the air, primarily on
SSB and PSK31, as a demonstration station
and to offer radio merit badge training and
other activities. The West Virginia
reservation will become the permanent
home of the Jamboree, held every 4 years,



so any ham radio installations on the site can remain available for use during future Jamborees. Icom America, through its sponsorship of Radio Scouting, is providing three repeaters at the Summit to serve the Jamboree and other programs held there, as well as the local community. Icom also is providing all Amateur Radio transceivers for the Jamboree and is the exclusive Amateur Radio transceiver sponsor for the 2013 event. ## Ham-radio Operators Test Sites

## to see if they'll cut the mustard for championships

PEPPERELL -- The World Championship of amateur radio is coming to Massachusetts next year, and local ham-radio operators are helping prepare for it by testing sites around the region this weekend.

"This is big international stuff, and Massachusetts is the one that's hosting it," said local radio operator Bob Reif, who helped set up a radio tower in the Heald Street Orchard Friday morning to test the site for the competition. "It's the Olympics of amateur radio."

The World Radiosport Team Championship, a competition held every four years, will be based at sites across Massachusetts in July 2014. The competition will feature 59 two-person teams from across the world, each stationed at a different site in the area.

Competitors will be chosen based on their scores in other major competitions, and will represent all regions of the world.

Teams will be scored based on factors such as how many sites they can communicate with in a 24-hour period and how many countries and regions of the world they make contact in. The winners will be presented with medals in a ceremony after the competition.

The efforts of the Nashoba Valley Amateur Radio Club this weekend serve two functions: to participate in this weekend's International Amateur Radio Union High Frequency Championship competition; and to test the functionality of the sites for next year's world championships.

Local operators are testing 30 sites across the region this weekend, from Plymouth to Hollis, N.H., by trying to communicate with other IARU championship operators around the globe with the goal of finding out which sites are fit for next year's competition.

"The sponsors are very concerned that nobody gets an unfair advantage. Not all radio locations are equal," said Bruce Blain, who was at the Heald Street Orchard site in Pepperell Friday afternoon.

Blain said the competition this weekend provides an opportunity to communicate with other operators around the world and test which sites around the area are good or bad for radio communications.

If any sites are substantially better or worse than average for communicating, they will be removed from the competition in order to ensure all competitors have an equal playing field next year.

Local amateur-radio operator James Youngberg said the WRTC organizers asked the local radio clubs, including the Nashoba Valley Amateur Radio Club, to help test the sites.

"It's a lot of engineering and an immense amount of logistics in planning," Youngberg said.

Reif said all the local operators participating in the testing are volunteering their time to help make the competition a success.

"We want amateur radio in New England to shine. We all have a desire to help it succeed," Reif said.

Youngberg said the global competition not only shines a light on New England's amateur radio community, but provides an opportunity to network with amateur radio operators worldwide.

"A lot of what ham radio is about is making friends around the world. Here's a chance to see them eye to eye," Youngberg said.


