DID YOU KNOW?

Around 1917, stories written by someone – or possibly multiple someone's – using the penname "The Old Man" appeared in QRT (a publication from the American Radio Relay League), assailing the dismal operating practices of the time. In one such article was the first mention of the "wouff hong," which even he had no clue what it was.

In time, The Old Man would adopt it as the name of a disciplinary object used to inflict physical punishment upon perpetrators of bad operating practices. Considering the poor standards of the time, it may have seemed necessary to keep some level of decency.

The Rettysnitch would follow in 1921, when it was presented before the members of the Washington, D.C. Radio Club, supposedly as a "gift" from The Old Man. The method of application in which the Rettysnitch was used remains speculative to the majority of HAM radio operators today. The two missing teeth and, the materials used, suggest that it must have seen quite a bit of use and abuse before getting there.

The Old Man would eventually be revealed to be Hiram Percy Maxim himself, a co-founder of the ARRL.

Jamboree on the Air

When Scouts want to meet young people from another country, they usually think of attending a World Jamboree. But few people realize that each year more than half a million Scouts and Guides "get together" over the airwaves for the annual Jamboree-on-the-Air (JOTA). The World Scout Bureau reported that the 2010 JOTA had just over 700,000 Scout participants from nearly 6,000 amateur radio stations! Modern technology offers Scouts the exciting opportunity to make friends in other countries without leaving home. JOTA is an annual event in which Boy and Girl Scouts and Guides from all over the world speak to each other by means of Amateur (ham) Radio. Scouting experiences are exchanged and ideas are shared via radio waves. Since 1958 when the first Jamboree-on-the-Air was held, millions of Scouts have met each other through this event. Many contacts made during JOTA have resulted in pen pals and links between Scout troops that have lasted many years. With no restrictions on age or on the number of participants, and at little or no expense, JOTA allows Scouts to contact each other by ham radio. The radio stations are operated by licensed amateur radio operators. Many Scouts and leaders hold licenses and have their own stations, but the majority participate in JOTA through stations operated by local radio clubs and individual radio amateurs. Some operators use television or computer-linked communications.

JOTA is held the third weekend in October of each year. JOTA takes place starting Saturday at 0000 hours local time (12:00 AM) to Sunday, 23.59 hours local time (12:00 PM), though some

activity continues over from Friday to

Monday to take advantage of long distance (DX) time differences.

Please note that the World Scout Frequencies changed 1 July 2007. The International Amateur Radio Union (IARU) changed its band plans to create space for more digital transmissions. Some Scout frequencies are affected by this. Traditionally, Scout Frequencies were chosen in a seg-

ment where low-power, simple stations are transmitting (QRP). This allows Scouts to operate such stations from camp sites and still be able to communicate with others. Some of these frequencies have changed over time. The amateur radio bands are increasingly busy with competitions. With the Scout frequencies chosen outside of the contest segments as far as possible, Scout stations can operate undisturbed.

We look forward to participating in this event as a Club. We encourage you to join us!

BEING PREPARED... With Water

Before an Earthquake:

Locate main water line, water heater(s) and shut-off valve (s). Mark with fluorescent/reflective paint or tape so they can

be found in the dark.

Learn how to operate shut-off valves to water lines, water heater, and how to remove any covers.

Keep wrenches handy and any other tools needed to remove covers and shut off water lines and water heater.

Store at least 3 gallons of water per person (1 gal. per person, per day). Replace commercially bottled water by the expiration date, water treated with unscented bleach after 6 months.

Keep water in all vehicles.

Keep extra water on hand for pets.

Keep chlorine bleach handy and/or water purification tablets on hand.

Do not add coloring/disinfecting products to toilet tank (a source of emergency water).

Brace, strap, or anchor the water heater.

After an Earthquake:

Shut off main water valve to prevent contamination.

Check pipes for leaks/breaks.

Do not drink, bathe in, or wash anything with tap water until advised it is safe.

Do not use food or water that may have been contaminated by untreated water (i.e. broken water/sewer/gas lines, flood, etc.).

Do not store food or water near household cleaners or contaminants.

Do not use pool/spa water.

Do not use toilets or dump waste in drains.

Check if sewage lines are intact.

Plug bathtub/sink drains to prevent backup.

Emergency drinking water sources:

Hot water heaters hold 30-60 gallons of water.

Turn off electricity or gas to water heater before draining into containers.

Toilet reservoir tanks.

Melted ice cubes, juices in canned foods.

Stored drinking water.

How to disinfect water for drinking:

Strain water through a clean cloth or handkerchief to remove debris or sediment.

Then do **ONE** of the following:

- >_ Boil water rapidly for 1 minute.
- > Use water purification tablets.
- >_ Add unscented chlorine bleach:
 - = 4 drops bleach per 1 qt. water
 - = 1/4 teaspoon bleach per gallon water
 - = 1 teaspoon bleach per 5 gallons water Let stand 1/2-hour before using.


