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# PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE ByAlex Marko, KD6LPA

Coming up in October, you'll have an opportunity to get SSTV from the International Space Station (ISS for short). For those of you unfamiliar with SSTV, it stands for Slow Scan TeleVision, which essentially allows you to send & receive still frame images from your amateur radio equipment when connected to a Kenwood VC-H1 or any computer running SSTV software.

The Kenwood VC-H1 (pictured to the right) was a portable device designed to translate pictures into sound, which the radio could then transmit. When receiving, the VC-H1 interprets those sounds back into pictures, which would show up on the built-in display. Unfortunately, the VC-H1 is no longer made, but every once in a while you can find one used on eBay or even at the swap meet.

If you don't have a VC-H1, you can use your computer and download MMSSTV software to do the equivalent work. You'll need a cable that connects from the "audio out" port of your radio to the "microphone input" of your computer. If you're interested in transmitting SSTV, you'll need some additional circuitry. I've found it easiest to buy the "Saratoga EZ-PSK" interface which has pre-built connections for all the major radio gear including Yaesu, Kenwood, Icom, etc. For more information, you can visit their web site at: http://www.saratogaham.com/ezpsk/





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# "EARTHQUAKE SHAKEOUT 2"

On November 13, 2008 at 10:00 AM an immense earthquake will rip down the San Andreas Fault, the largest earthquake in modern Southern California history. Yes, it's only a drill, but there is virtually a 100% chance that it will happen within the next 30 years, and maybe tomorrow because it is overdue. This shakeout drill is our chance to practice what



to do when it happens. The scenario, the first public project of the US Geological Survey's (USGS) multidisciplinary team, was created to show how hazards science can increase a community's resiliency to natural disasters through improved planning, mitigation and response. Participants in the 4-day event beginning with the quake will be emergency responders, cities, disaster relief organizations, schools, businesses, and residents of communities all over Southern California. Though this is only a drill, it is a highly credible scenario, and a real earthquake could be even stronger.

Seismic Information We live in earthquake country. There are over 30 earthquakes a day in Southern California. There are 7 known faults that have the potential within the next 30 years of producing a quake equal to or larger than the 1994 Northridge quake of 6.7 magnitude that will affect us. The highest potential for a destructive earthquake is the Southern San Andreas Fault, and the drill will be based on the destruction from a 7.8 magnitude quake. Geologic history shows that this section of the fault has ruptured on the average of each 150 years. The last quake on the southern section of the fault was 7.9

magnitude in 1857 from Central California to the Cajon Pass. The section south of the Cajon Pass closest to us hasn't ruptured since 1680!

Earth Sciences: The massive rip in the fault will take two minutes to propagate from its point of origin at the Salton Sea to its conclusion at the Cajon Pass. The resulting ground displacement will be from 7 to 20 feet. The intensity of shaking is shown on the accompanying map, with red being the highest intensity, and where 12 million people live. The period of intense shaking in Los Angeles will last from 55 to 65 seconds with lesser shaking following for more time. This compares to a period of intense shaking during the Northridge quake of just 7 seconds. Each second of shaking intensifies the amount of resulting damage, with the last second being more destructive than the first. The shaking will last for 71 seconds on the Peninsula, though at a lower intensity because of the geology. However, aftershocks will be triggered on other faults in Southern California, and some of these will be more intense than the Northridge Quake. Keep in mind that there are two faults under or near the Peninsula which CalTech rates as capable of over a 6.0 magnitude.

This Week's Tip Communications will most likely be completely disabled throughout the area. Therefore it is important that you set up a central communication source outside the area – a family member or friend - that all of your family members can contact. When telephone and internet service is out, amateur radio operators are the saviors who will provide backup for communicating to first responders and families. Make sure you know where your amateur radio operators are located. Get information about RPVs next amateur radio class (Sep. 27 & Oct.4) from walt.ordway@yahoo.com. It's also most important to register yourself and your family at <a href="www.ShakeOut.org/register">www.ShakeOut.org/register</a> so USGS and Caltech can get feedback on how many residents are participating in the drill. Please provide the attached ShakeOut registration form to those people who do not have computers.

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# "Listening" By Joy Matlack, KD6FJV

A lot of us as ham radio enthusiasts get our start by listening to the others on the radio. We like to think that it will help us become better or more accepted operators. Who do we listen to? Sometimes it is a group we know, but more often it turns out to be a group that we have heard about, or one that we are thinking we might want to join. By listening before we talk we hope to prepare ourselves to meet the standards of the group. But what happens if we listen to several groups, and each one is different? How do we learn which ways of operating on a radio are the best?

There is no best. Just as everything else in life there is difference. Difference is not good or bad, and should not be judged as such. So what I encourage hams to do is, embrace the differences, both in the hobby and the people who are involved in it. We need to listen to each other and explore the differences that we find. A new ham for instance, or one who is new to a particular club or group will ask lots of questions as they try to sort out what the normal is for the new group that they are joining.

Questions are something that can be taken in several ways. Most of the time I find that the mood of the person being asked has as much to do with the answer given as actual knowledge. Sometimes this is not even thought about by either participant in the conversation and assumptions start being made on both sides. This once again highlights the differences that one finds between people. Ham radio operators are no different than anyone else, we all want to be good at what we do. Particularly for those of us in Emergency Communications and/or Disaster Response. It is my experience that the best way to excel at being a ham operator is being a good listener, both on the air and off.

Ham radio has a great tradition of Elmers. For those of you who might not be aware of the term, an Elmer is someone who mentors and teaches a newcomer in the hobby. All amateur radio operators fall under this title. Either by intentionally and willingly teaching someone we know, or by the simple fact that radio waves are open and people listen to us. In this way we teach our listeners by example if not by direct answers to questions.

Being a ham radio operator means many different things, everyone in the hobby has their own reasons and stories to tell. But every ham operator I ever met shares a single trait. That trait is a love of communicating, and a very big part of communicating is listening. Without a listener we can never have a true conversation. By listening to those around us we keep amateur radio alive and well in all its glorious differences.
