NEW CONSTITUTION AND BY-LAWS IN EFFECT!

At our last club meeting, the membership voted in the proposed changes to the club Constitution and By-Laws by approximately 95% (by those in attendance). However, concern was raised as to whether the legalize of the previous Constitution and By-Laws meant "simple majority" of members present, or "simple majority" of the entire membership.




The President called a special council meeting on Wednesday, September 30th to discuss these issues. After a long discussion, the council deferred to Robert's Rules of Order to settle the issue. In short, 30% of the membership needed to vote "yes" to enact the changes. At present, our total membership count is 81 members. Thirty percent would be 25 votes. Out of the 35 members present, 32 voted to enact the changes to the club Constitution and By-Laws, 1 vote against, 1 vote abstained, and 1 ineligible voter based on a family membership. Therefore, the 32 "yes" votes taken at the last club meeting was sufficient to enact the new Constitution and By-Laws.

CLUB OFFICER ELECTIONS IN NOVEMBER!

One of the new provisions in the new Constitution is the addition of a third council member at large. The idea is to spread out the work load so no one member has an unfair share of tasks to perform.

Previously, if one was elected to Council Member #1, then the tasks of that position were essentially tied to that title. With the new Constitution in effect, the tasks of each Council Member are negotiated on the fly by the



As a result, our upcoming election in November will elect a President, Vice-President, Secretary/Treasurer and three council members at large for the year 2010.

So please start thinking about the upcoming election and how you can help serve your club. New members offering fresh ideas help keep the club running smoothly!


To comply with the new Constitution, the President will appoint (subject to council approval) a third council member at large to complete the 2009 council term.

"An Inside Look at Ray's Introduction to Ham Radio"

First licensed in 1960 as a Novice Operator:

A good buddy, Jim Manson and I tested at the QTH of Lee Bruce, WA6DII, we both passed

and mailed our Novice paper work to the FCC in Gettysburg. A minor error was made on the application by our tester and the FCC mailed the forms back to Jim and I. We quickly got Lee to sign our applications and returned the forms to the FCC. After waiting 8-weeks, we both received our Novice license, I received WV6OWM. Jim received WV6OWO. Jim's call is one dash longer.



April 1961 and June Field Day 1961:

I went down to the Federal Building in downtown Los Angeles and took my General Exam, which required 13-wpm and a 50-question exam. After passing the General exam, you would wait another 8 weeks for the license to arrive. The Monday before Field Day, June 1961, the mailman delivered my WA6OWM Amateur Radio General License. My Dad and Hardy Glenn, W6RZB rented a trailer and I was off to my first Field Day to use my new call. The setup consisted of a Off-center Fed Windom antenna, Elmac AF-67 50W AM/CW transmitter and a Pearson PMR-7 mobile amateur band receiver. That first station was located below the northeast corner of the Don Wallace, W6AM Antenna Ranch in Palos Verdes. W6AM decided to check out 15 Meters and found a big signal on his Europe Rhombic antenna. As he looked over his fence he saw our setup and drove down to meet us. So here I am at my first Field Day with my new call, and meeting one of the best know Amateur Operator in the world, and by the way, we all sat around eating ice cream and listing to stories from W6AM. What a Field Day to remember...

Station Setup:

The shack at WA6OWM consists of Yaesu and Icom equipment. For HF, Yaesu FT-847 Transceiver provides RF on 160-meters through 70-cm, and SSB, CW, AM and FM modes and Sat-

ellite operation. The FT-847 is computer controlled. The Operating System for the home station is Windows Vista and the backup and portable computer runs Windows XP. The interface hardware is a microHAM "microKeyer II" and the station software is "Ham Radio Deluxe/ Digital Master 780 V5.0 Beta". One unique features of the microKeyer II is to



bridge two serial CAT devices from a single source. A single transceiver can control CAT functions in two separate software packages. An example, I run my station log on COM1 and a BPSK31 Decoder on COM2, both connected to one transceiver. Both programs control the transceiver, without locking up either COM Port. The backup computer is connected to a US Interface "Navigator" and "AirLink Express" software. A Yaesu FT-897D HF+6M/V/UHF All Mode transceiver is used as a backup, for Single Operator 2 Radio (SO2R) applications, and mobile/portable operations. A third setup uses Icom IC-751 160-10M 100 watt all mode, Icom IC-271H 2M 100 watt all mode and Icom IC-471H 70CM 70 watt all mode transceiver. A Yaesu FT-90, for 2M/70CM FM and a Kenwood TM-331, for 125CM completes the setup. Both FM radios are connected to Diamond dual-band (2M/440Mhz and 2M/222Mhz) vertical antennas. Station power is provided by two 30-Amp Astron Power Supplies. UPS power supports the FT-90/TM-331 rigs and the computer setup. The HF station can be manually connected to two heavy duty battery systems.

A variety of antennas are available, including dipoles, Butternut verticals (160-6M), an Hy-Gain AV-640 40-6M vertical, HyGain TH-3 triband yagi, Mosley CL33 triband yagi, HyGain 2-el 40M/3-el 20M yagi, and miscellaneous M-Square yagi and loop antennas for 2M and 70CM, F9FT antennas for 432-mHz and 1296-mHz. An LDG AT-200Pro Autotuner, WX0B Six-Pak remote antenna switches and Dunestar Systems Model 600 Multi Band Bandpass filters complimentary the SO2R configuration.

The second QTH has both a Yaesu FT-990 and Yaesu FT-100D, microHAM interface and a center loaded ground plane antenna, with 16 radials. Next to a golf course, in a very quite area and a quarter mile from salt water, the GP antenna works great.

WA6OWM Mobile...

In the early days I had a lot of Phone contacts. Starting in 1962, I would operate mobile. My favorite bands included 80, 40 and 20 meters. Here in the South Bay, we used 3995 kHz for mobile and emergency communications. I homebrewed a simple two-tube 80 meter crystal controlled AM transmitter. The rig consisted of a 12AT7, dual triode tube (Mic/control carrier modulator and crystal oscillator) to a TV sweep tube as a 120 watt Class-C RF amplifier. In 1964 I picked up my first Swan SSB transceiver. You would work the western US in the day-time, and the world at night. On many a night I would work the Amateur Operators at McMurdo Sound in the Antarctica. I also became interested in the County Hunters group (14336 kHz) with the goal of contacting all 3079 US counties. I would mobile around California and many of the states west of the Mississippi providing county contacts.

WA6OWM Contesting....

About 1964, the FCC re-introduced the Amateur Advanced Class License. My next goal was to pass that exam. So I became the club instructor, and held classes for the Novice and Advanced license, as well as Morse Code. Several of our current members participated in the classes and still today hold an Advanced License. With the CW classes I practiced CW and force myself to operate a lot more CW. I entered every contest I could. My theory was, I had to copy the exchange correctly the first time, or lose the contact. After a year of contests, my CW speed was up to what I needed for the Extra Class. Contests are good...

WA6OWM DX-ing

Along with domestic contest there are many DX Contests. Groups of Amateur Operators would schedule there vacation at some remote location with the contest over the middle weekend. Since they would operate the full 24- or 48-hours of the contest, you had a better chance of working these stations. I am at 238 countries (DXCC) and 40 zones (WAZ).

This year starts my 49th year in Amateur Radio, what a blast....
